Local Scholarship:

Suzanne DuFore, co-chair, has overseen the scholarship process this year. Each of the five readers of the committee has read and evaluated 18 applications. The selection takes place on May 3. You will learn the names of the recipients at the June 10, Scholarship Luncheon. Once again, our branch will celebrate the attainment of one of our goals thanks to your involvement.

On May 6, AAUW-HMB celebrates its 50th Anniversary. In addition to celebrating 50 years of local college educated women coming together to support each other, our organization has focused on meeting a greater goal. Our goal has been to support higher education and equal educational opportunities for women worldwide, nationally, and locally. The first local scholarship for \$500 was received by Susan Alves in 1973. Since then member fund raising efforts, bequests, and personal donations have provided a total of \$94,500 to 79 recipients! The scholarships have honored founding members Ivania Portocarerro, and Edna Cox. Other scholarships have been given in memory of treasured members. A recent bequest from the James and Gloria Dudfield continues that tradition of supporting education for women. An anonymous donor has made it possible for our branch to offer scholarships to female graduates from Pilarcitos Alternative High School. Member donations continue to make local scholarships possible. Thank you.

CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF TECH TREK AS WE NAME OUR 2017 CAMPERS

The branch Tech Trek committee -- which this year included Carol Joyce, Mardee Schweikert, Pauline Shue and new member Mary Wynne -- completed the selection process for Tech Trek 2017. Of the 50 girls nominated by the Cunha seventh-grade math and science teachers to receive our application, 20 returned the forms by the postmark deadline. From that group, 12 students were interviewed after school on March 22 and 23, and five were selected to receive full scholarships to Stanford Tech Trek, July 16 - 22.

Thank you to all our generous donors. Your support is needed more that ever, as the cost has gone up this year to \$1,000 per girl, which includes room and board for the action-packed week of STEM workshops and field trips.

Public Policy:

The US Senate changed the rules to lower the number of votes required to confirm a Supreme Court justice from 60 to a simple majority thus approving Judge Neil Gorsuch 54-45. He has repeatedly ruled against students with disabilities seeking a public education, sided with big business and has views that could endanger worker's rights on issues like employment discrimination. worker safety and wages.

President Trump's FY2018 initial budget plan slashes US Dept. of Ed. funding by \$9 billion or nearly 14%. The Trump/DeVos agenda calls for voucher schemes that provide billions of dollars for private schools while slashing funding for after school programs in public schools, Pell Grants, teacher professional training and class size reduction.AAUW is carefully monitoring this issue. We need to contact our congressional representatives to state that we are opposed to this budget proposal.

We are in La Paz, Bolivia (the highest capitol city in the world, almost 12.000 feet!). Recently the newspaper reported several articles of interest to women. One was the implementation of STEM programs for women in the universities with emphasis on engineering and computer science (sound familiar?). The other article was about women marching for the right to control their reproductive rights. It really shows us that women's issues are really world wide.







Bridge:


