Financial need, GPA, extracurricular activities, college honors, work experience during college, and community service are all evaluated. The readers arrive at tangible scores, but before the selections are finalized, the readers also consider the intangibles, those personal drives that pop out as the essays are read. Anyone who has participated in an interview process will understand how these intangible qualities are crucial when making selections. Since we never meet the candidate, the essay is very important.

I thank the committee members for their dedication to this complex process of selection. I, also, thank our generous members who continue to support our local scholarship fund. Every donation matters!

## 2014 TECH TREK APPLICATIONS POUR IN

Our Tech Trek camper selection process is well underway. Applications from the 50 seventh-grade nominees, who were identified by their math and science teachers, were due to be postmarked by March 8. The committee (including Pauline Shue, Nancy Struck, Mardee Schweikert and brand-new member Caryl Battles) is currently reading the applications to narrow the group down to 10 to 12 students who must then participate in an interview on April 9-10. From those semifinalists, five girls will be selected to receive full \$900 scholarships to Tech Trek at Stanford University, Week 2, July 13 - 19.

All California AAUW branches sponsoring girls at any of the 10 Tech Trek camps in the state must follow the same selection process that includes an application with an essay and a follow-up interview. Tech Trek committee instructions remind us: "... Tech Trek is basically a 'camp of geeks' (We Love Geeks!), so girls you choose should feel comfortable in that environment. The most important thing is that your candidates WANT to come to Tech Trek. ... Girls are expected to attend classes Monday-Friday, be attentive, and participate fully in all activities. Hands-on science is fun for interested students but a disappointment for those not well prepared ..." The interview requirement was added to better gauge students' genuine enthusiasm for STEM subjects. Our committee has found it helpful, if heart-wrenching, as we meet more truly qualified, intelligent girls than we can send.

**PAST TECH TREKKERS:** Some of our Tech Trek alums who are now in high school have entered the highly competitive application process to return to Tech Trek as Junior or Senior Counselors. Only a handful of high-schoolers are chosen for each campus, and it is a great honor to be selected. Past Tech Trekkers from our branch who have served in this coveted role at Stanford Tech Trek include Sabina Perlsweig (UC) and Adi Padilla (SFSU, B.S. 2012, Business Admin/Marketing).

I felt so grateful for AAUW Funds, which supported Lilly’s case through the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF). The first bill signed by President Obama was the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act in 2009, and AAUW was there! AAUW Executive Director Linda Hallman and Lisa Maatz, AAUW’s VP of Government Relations, sat in the front row. Brava, Ladies!

## ARE YOU "BOSSY"?

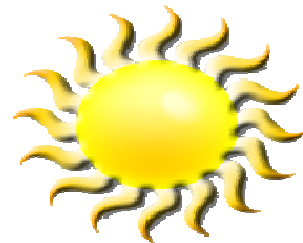
When you were growing up were you ever accused of being "bossy"? Why is it that when boys assert themselves the same way, they are showing "executive leadership skills", but a girl is "bossy"? Probably many of us in AAUW were considered "bossy" when we were growing up !!

There is a new movement afoot to empower young girls, to channel this "bossiness" into taking on leadership roles. Three of the most influential women in America, **Sheryl Sandberg**, Face book COO and author of the best selling book "LEAN IN", **Condoleezza Rice**, former Sec. of State and Stanford University professor and **Anna Maria Chavez**, CEO of the Girl Scouts of the USA, have joined together to launch a public service campaign to ban the word "bossy", a negative label they say is too often applied to young girls, and is one of the many ways we discourage them from speaking up.

The road to leadership starts in school. Research shows that by middle school, more boys than girls are interested in leading (similar to girls in this age group's reluctance to participate in STEM activities). What can be done to discourage these stereotypes? The "BAN BOSSY" campaign aims to help parents and educators to empower girls to stand up and speak out. Parents can help their daughters commit small acts of assertiveness, educators need to observe dynamics in group work assuring that girls take credit for their participation in the project and girls need to learn how to introduce opinions without apologies or making statements sound like questions.

We need to empower our young girls and women in STEM activities, but also to feel comfortable taking on leadership roles. Every year AAUW sponsors a Leadership Conference for university women in July, close to Washington DC. Maura is selling AAUW car license plates at the AAUW CA Convention this year to try to raise money to send one of our local girls to this conference. You can help by purchasing a license plate for your car from her.

## Home Theatre

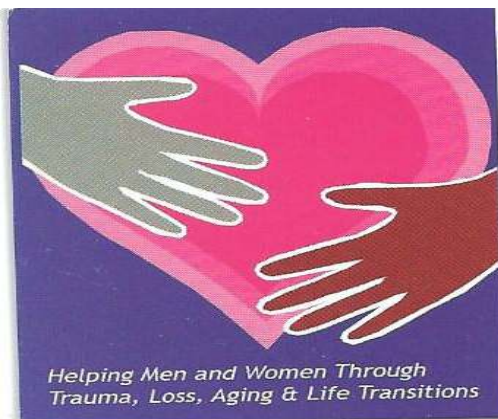
