LET'S TALK ABOUT AAUW FUNDS

The Public Policy Fund #4337 and What It Means For Our Membership

Since AAUW's Founding, our members and supporters have spoken out about policies important to women and girls. Without their voices, invaluable legislation would have never been passed. In recent years, such legislation included the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, and the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act.

AAUW's policy work connects and rallies advocates at the local, state, national, and global levels to advance our work to empower women and girls. With the member-endorsed Public Policy Program as our guide, AAUW uses lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women. Lisa Maatz, AAUW's legislative advocate in Washington, DC, recently spoke to members of the AAUW San Francisco/San Mateo County Inter-branch Council (IBC), about these issues.

For all that has been accomplished, we have further to go in the areas of equal pay, protecting women's reproductive rights, and supporting quality education, to name but a few.

We can thank our branch's Public Policy co-chairs, Carlos and Mary Vargas, for keeping us educated about public policy issues.

HALF MOON BAY AAUW LOCAL SCHOLARSHIPS

The scholarship process has begun. Half Moon Bay High School and Pescadero High School have provided the address information of 247 female graduates from the 2011 and 2012 graduating classes.

The application form and invitational letter have been updated and printed. On Jan. 22, the scholarship committee volunteers prepared the envelopes for mailing. Our HMB Chamber of Commerce membership allows us to use the chamber's bulk mailing rate...a real cost saver. Applications must be mailed no later than March 15.

Next, the five Local Scholarship Committee readers will evaluate the applications in preparation for the April 16 selection meeting. We usually have 17-18 applicants. Each reader reviews every application. At the selection meeting a consensus is reached selecting the 3 recipients. The chair then notifies the recipients by a phone call and the other applicants by mail. Sadly, we can't honor each applicant because each is so amazingly talented. However, a respectful and encouraging letter thanks each for the time that was taken to prepare the application. Finally, on May 17, at the Scholarship Brunch, the recipients will be honored and introduced to the membership.

The process isn't quite finished. Each recipient must confirm registration before the check is sent. This part of the process usually occurs late in July. It is an amazing feeling to send each of the recipients a check for \$2000 to support the continuing education of these talented women. The committee is proud to do this on the member's behalf. Thank you all for making these scholarships possible.

2013 Tech Trekkers Win Science Fair Awards

Our five 2013 Tech Trekkers recently participated in the eighth-grade science fair at Cunha Intermediate School tackling a wide range of topics from Physical Science to Behavioral Science. Two of the girls are among the 25 students who have been selected to progress to the San Mateo County Science Fair after winning ribbons at the annual school competition.

Amy Nguyen won a second-place ribbon in the Earth Science category for her project "It's the Acid." Her experiment with mussel shells tested how ocean acidification affects marine life. She said the shells immersed in water of higher acidity showed measurable weight loss. Katherine Dioli studied "The Mpemba Effect," and used 10 different starting temperatures to yield lots of good data to try to determine "if hot water freezes faster than similar amounts of cold water under the same conditions."



While Carly Bunuan experimented with plants in "Is WiFi Harmful To You?" and was awarded a second-place ribbon, Kailey Cline wanted to see if teens and adults could pass the fifth-grade STAR test. "Are You Smarter Than a Fifth-grader?" was her query. And Selina Hermann was interested in whether boys and girls have the same fears and whether their fears change as they grow older. Her project "Boo! What Scares You?" was rewarded with a third-place ribbon for her survey of 135 elementary students. It didn't surprise her that, in our part of the world, fears of natural disasters such as earthquakes and tsunamis top the list.

Our application process is about to commence for Tech Trek 2014. Seventh-grade math and science teachers will be asked to nominate girls who will receive an application to apply to the 17th annual AAUW-CA Math and Science Camp. The applications will be due back to our branch committee in March. We will select five girls to attend Tech Trek at the Stanford site in July.
