January General Meeting Women and Politics

When: Monday, January 16, 2017 Where: Community United Methodist Church In Half Moon Bay Time: 7:00 pm to 8:30 pm

<u>Carol Joyce</u> will speak on the under representation of women leaders in politics and how the "Women's Community Leadership Network (WCLN)" is working to prepare women in San Mateo County to seek appointed or elected positions. Carol is a Board member of the Women's Community Leadership Network. The Women's Community Leadership Network is a non-partisan, nonprofit organization that educates women on public policy and community issues and equips women with the skills to seek appointed and elected positions.

Carol is also a member of the Half Moon Bay Branch of AAUW. Carol's presentation will include an overview of AAUW's 2016 report *Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership.* This will include current statistics on the number of women elected officials at local, state and national levels, the reasons women don't run for office and the WCLN trainings and networking opportunities that will prepare women to become political leaders in their community.

We will also have three other women speaking on Leadership Opportunities .

<u>Julia McKeon</u> will also join us for our Jan. 16th meeting. Julia works with Abundant Grace Coastside Workers which sponsored an eight-week community leadership program called Adelante Mujeres which means "women moving forward" in Spanish.

<u>Deputy Sheriff Shawn Chase & Odalys Sonoqui</u> from the SAL program "Empowering Young Women" will be coming.

Odalys Sonoqui, a student at HMB High, was selected last year by the San Mateo County Sheriffs Activities League (SAL) to attend a leadership conference in Washington, D.C., and the Teen Leadership Conference in Anaheim. She said the experience was "life-changing." She was chosen "Youth of the Year" for 2016.

PUBLIC POLICY

Each November the AAUW Public Policy team reflects on some milestones achieved by women over the past year.

JANUARY: lowa elects the first woman, Linda Upmeyer(R-Clear Lake) as speaker of lowa's House of Representatives.

FEBRUARY: The first Native American woman, Diane Humetewa, -Hopi tribe- was confirmed to the Federal Court in Arizona.

MARCH: Paid sick leave makes progress in the states. Vermont became the fifth state to require employers to provide paid sick days.

APRIL: Historic Sewall-Belmont becomes nation's newest national monument. The new monument is named after suffragist Alma Belmont.

MAY: Women pilots interment rights restored at Arlington National Cemetery.

JUNE: The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in favor (4-3) of a race-conscious admissions program at the University of Texas at Austin.

JULY: The US Department of Justice (DOJ) announced a plan to train over 28,000 department employees on implicit bias. The training will specifically confront subtle views on race, sexual orientation and gender.

AUGUST: New innovative efforts to boost voter registration, for example: California passed a bill to create an online link between class enrollment and voter registration for almost 3 million students in the state's public colleges and universities.

SEPTEMBER; Carla Hayden was sworn in as the new Chief Librarian at the Library of Congress. She is the first woman and first African American to hold this position.

OCTOBER; An important and bipartisan sexual assault bill was signed by President Obama. Survivors have the right to have a rape kit preserved for the entirety of a case's statute of limitations, be informed about forensic exam results, and be notified before the kit is to be destroyed.

NOVEMBER; In 2007, there will be 21 women serving in the US. Senate--the highest number in history. There will be a record number of women of color.

AAUW has the largest lobby in Washington advocating for women and girls. They will be monitoring Trump's US Cabinet nominations to be sure that the Senate fulfills its obligation to thoroughly examine each and every nominee's record and conducts detailed confirmation hearings before taking a vote. There are also three extra weeks in 2016 to work with Congress on AAUW priorities in the New Year including equal pay, safe and equitable schools and other AAUW public policy priorities.

Celebrating 50 Years of Supporting Women and Girls

Those of us who attended the holiday party learned about two very exciting ways we will be celebrating our 50th anniversary in 2017. One way will involve dressy clothes, delicious food, and drinks. The second way will provide us with a source of pride for many years to come.

For several months, the board has sought a special project worthy of a 50 year anniversary. Our first choice was to **establish a new R&P grant honoring our branch's 50 years of service.** The establishment process was quick and fairly painless. \$5,000 from our Fund Account plus a very generous donation of \$10,000 from the Edna Cox Fund allowed us to send a check for \$15,000 along with the grant application. In early December, we received confirmation that the grant application was accepted.

The grant is for \$75,000 and the funding needs to be completed in 10 years. We sent \$15,000, so we still need to contribute \$60,000. Those of you who usually make unrestricted donations to AAUW, can now write R&P #4420 and it will help pay off our grant. I will send contributions during the year from our several fundraisers. Also, other branches often contribute to help each other complete grants. Enabling women to complete research and projects on into the future is a very satisfying way to celebrate this important anniversary. We hope you agree and will donate as generously as you can. Remember to note that you want it to be credited to Grant #4420.
