Applications for Tech Trek 2017 Sent Out

The Cunha seventh-grade math and science teachers submitted 52 nominations of girls who show a strong interest in math, science and technology and would thrive at Tech Trek.

Interested students have a postmark deadline of March 1 to return the applications with parent certification and an essay. The applications are read by a committee of 5-6 members, then we interview 10-12 semifinalists. The interview is a mandatory part of the national AAUW Tech Trek selection process.

This will be the 20th summer of Tech Trek math and science camp at Stanford University.

Statewide, more than 8,000 girls have had the opportunity to attend a camp over the past two decades.

Our week of camp is called Camp Hopper, named for computer scientist Grace Hopper and will take place July 16-22. Members who are interested in serving as dorm moms, registrars/greeters, or as camp nurse should call me immediately so that I can put you in contact with Camp Directors Melinda Moir (Santa Rosa branch) and Maureen Buchner (San Mateo branch).

Public Policy:

With recent events in Washington DC, AAUW National is even more concerned on a great number of issues. The latest Edition of the AAUW magazine OUTLOOK has two very good articles on these main issues. There is also a good article on school vouchers and what it will do to public schools, especially with the recent appointment of Betsy DeVos as Sec. of Education. Also of great concern are the environment, foreign relations, Planned Parenthood, the right to choose (especially with our new US Vice Pres), health care, and Immigration and the "dream act" which allows young people, who came here before they were 15 (undocumented) to be able to get a Social Security number and a driver's licence. AAUW has it's work cut out for it these next 4 years. We must be vigilant so as to not loose many of the rights we have won over the years Did you know that Title IX is celebrating 45 years on June 27?. This came out of the Civil Rights movements of the 60's that integrated schools and gave us the right to bilingual education. Title IX was first started at that time to give women equality of opportunities in sports, but it is now much more that that. It covers both sexes and includes sexual harassment and violence, protections for pregnant and parenting students, equality in career and technical education, athletics and transgender students, cyber bulling and much more.. All schools must have a person in charge of Title IX, overseeing it and being sure they are in compliance with the laws. Students and parents must be informed of who this person is and procedures for filing a complaint. In Half Moon High School the person in charge of Title IX is principal John Nassar. In a recent interview he stated that ALL programs are open to ALL students, yes even football!!

FUNDRAISING REWARDS - AAUW Funds

I recently went to the AAUW national website to research the most recent recipients of our R&P grants. I'd like to share what I found with you.

For 2016-17, funds earned by the Edna Cox Grant were awarded to Summer Zeimetz. Summer is pursuing her master's degree in speech pathology at Portland State University in Oregon. Previously, she lived abroad and taught English as a foreign language in South Korea, where she organized debate and conversation groups for girls to lift up young women's voices in English speaking cultures. As a speech pathologist, Summer intends to work with girls and women from culturally diverse populations to develop strong communication skills.

The Ruth Rafello Grant for 2016-17 was awarded to the Young Women Leaders Program at the University of Central Florida in Orlando. The program is an after-school mentoring curriculum pairing one seventh grade girl, "little sister" with one college student, or "big sister." This project integrates a subprogram, STEM(Science, Leadership and Mentoring) which promotes interest in careers in science through activities, workshops, and weekend events at the University of Central Florida.






