Recap of a Marvelous Year for AAUW Funds!

Special thanks go to the dedicated members of our AAUW Funds Committee, whose guidance and support were invaluable as we set course for this past year: Julie Gerth, Helen Paul and Ruth Rafello. I am also grateful for an outstanding Board of Directors who worked well together to carry out the mission of AAUW: Advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research. And that is what drives AAUW Funds.

Throughout the year, this column looked at some of the various funds which make up AAUW Funds, such as the Research & Project Grant Endowments, the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund #9170, the Legal Advocacy Fund #3999, the Public Policy Fund #4337, and the Leadership Programs Fund #4339.

In November local writer and activist, Brigid O'Farrell, author of *She Was One of Us, Eleanor Roosevelt and the American Worker*, spoke about Eleanor's lifelong commitment to women and to the U.S. labor movement. Brigid's talk tied in perfectly with The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund #9170, which supports AAUW research reports on such issues as women in STEM occupations, sexual harassment at school, the gender pay gap, and more.

In December our branch was proud to send \$2,700 earned through fundraisers to our national AAUW Funds organization, which, when added to individual members' contributions, brought the total to \$3,300.

March found us welcoming Donna Knowlton, Development Director of Next Door Solutions to Domestic Violence, a recipient of a Community Action Grant from AAUW Funds (national). Donna gave us an upbeat message about a difficult subject.

May brought us the opportunity to honor anyone chosen as a Named Gift Honoree at our Scholarship Luncheon—but you'll have to wait until May to learn who received this award!

I look forward to another exciting year exploring AAUW Funds with all of you.

DID'J KNOW?

That AAUW has been doing significant research almost since its founding in 1881? The first research project was to dispel the myth that higher education was detrimental to women's health. In 1921 the association raised money to buy Marie Curie expensive but much needed radium which she used for her further research. In the aftermath of World War II countless women from formerly occupied countries in Europe received fellowships to further their education with the proviso that they return to their own countries to help in the rebuilding. In the 1990's many women African educators were brought to the United States for summers to study new methods in education to use in their developing nations. Later research done in the 1990's led to groundbreaking projects of how to encourage girls to study math and science. Tech Trek is part of that response. We are part of a vital organization which is always on the cutting edge of what is needed to make our society a better place for us all.

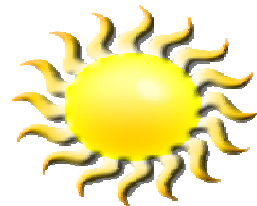

AAUW Convention—Public Policy

Your Public Policy Co-Chairs attended the AAUW State Convention in LA this April 11-13. Here are several topics pertaining to public policy that we thought to be of special interest to our branch here in HMB.

1. TITLE IX: Beyond Athletics

We usually think of Title IX as just dealing with equality in athletics, that the same access to activities offered to boys must be offered to girls. It is much more than this. Girls must also have equal access to facilities, programs, coaches and publicity. Title IX also covers sexual harassment, child abuse on campus, cyber bullies, the right to enroll in any course or program you wish, equal treatment in course requirements and to be considered for any work-study program without regard to gender. Title IX also protects teachers and coaches. It also protects pregnant students from being banned from school.

Though Title IX has been around for many years, many schools are out of compliance with the law. Each school must have a Title IX Coordinator who informs all students, every year, of their rights and how to protect them. Also, teachers, counselors, and other school employees must be informed every year of their rights and responsibilities under Title IX.

2. Public Policy

According to Shannon Smith-Crowley, AAUW CA legislative advocate in Sacramento, high priority issues for AAUW are the following: (1) Title IX in first place, (2) Cal/Works, and (3) Human Trafficking (most are forced workers).

The following are potential issues on the ballot and members should check the AAUW-CA Web site "Action Alerts" on the bill page for more information on:

- A. Tort reform (any non-criminal offense)
- B. Regulations on health services
- C. Gender equality and discrimination
- D. State Budget
- E. Education
- F. Cal/Works

There are 37 bills going through the Assembly at present. AAUW-CA supports the following:

- 1. AB 2350 (Bonilla) Graduate Student Maternity Leave
- 2. SB 477 (Steinberg) Human Trafficking/Forced Labor
- 3. AB 899 Cal/Works
- 4. AB 1347 Title IX compliance

It was emphasized by Smith-Crowley that members need to follow their legislator's actions/votes and follow the progress of the bills supported by AAUW-CA. This can be accessed through the AAUW-CA web site or members can contact her at: legislativeadvocate@AAUW_CA.org or (916) 457-5217

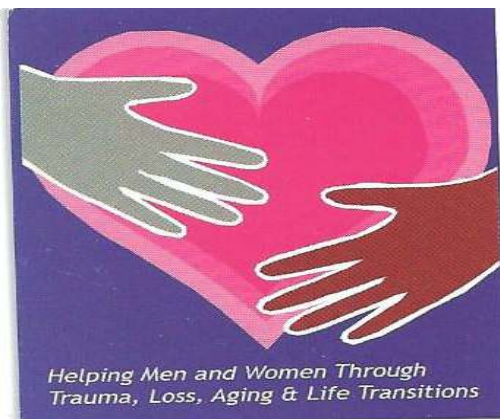
