In 2016, the branch will be able to award two \$2000 scholarships in her honor. The funds to support the Ivania Portocarrero Scholarships are made possible through member donations and local fundraisers. AAUW Community Action Grants

As one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women, AAUW is providing more than \$3.7 million in 241 fellowships and grants to outstanding women and non-profit organizations in the 2015-16 academic year. At our March general meeting, Jennifer Martinez shared her experience winning one of AAUW's Community Action Grants. Jennifer is the executive director of a non-profit organization serving low-income women in the San Francisco Bay Area. Her two-year grant is helping to finance the training of low-income and minority women to speak up at public meetings and become community activists for social change.

Community Action Grants are available to individuals, AAUW branches, and non-profit organizations to fund innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls. Some of you may remember that back in the 1990's, Marilyn Garrison and Katie Murdock won an AAUW Community Action grant. They produced posters showing local women performing non-traditional jobs at that time. Sets of those posters were distributed to schools on the coast to inspire girls to consider jobs in science, technology, engineering, and similar careers. The AAUW website has more details on applying for a Community Action Grant, as well as several other kinds of grants and fellowships.

BARRIERS AND BIAS: THE STATUS OF WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP,

examines the under representation of women in leadership roles in business, politics and education. Women leaders can make companies stronger and more profitable, but here are some statistics on leadership in business:

White males 63% White women 24% Black women 2% Hispanic women 1%
Asian American Women 1% Women of other racial or ethnic groups <1%

In the US Congress , 75% are men and 25% women, including 5% women of color.

State Governors are even worse, of the 50, only 6 are women with 2 of those, women of color

Women earn the majority of university degrees and there are more women in the work force than ever before, so why this discrepancy? Blatant sex discrimination is still a problem along with more subtle problems such as hostile work environments and negative stereotypes (can you get the coffee? Who will take care of your children? etc.)

What can be done about this problem?

INDIVIDUALS: Learn about your own subconscious bias Take the [AAUW](#) test online

EMPLOYERS: Promote flexibility and fair expectations for both women and men.

POLICY MAKERS; Support current legislation and regulations like the Paycheck Fairness Act , the Family Medical Leave Act and salary transparency

AAUW-CA Empowering You! Convention 2016

AAUW's state convention was held locally at the Marriott in San Mateo, Friday April 15- Sunday, April 17th. This convention was full of interesting seminars. Some highlights were:

Film screening of *The Hunting Ground*, a powerful documentary on rape on US college campuses, and how campus administration dealt with women who made allegation. A facilitated discussion about sexual assault on campus occurred after the viewing.

National Board chair, Patricia Fae Ho and AAUW CA President Kathleen Doty provided a great update on what is going on and the impact of AAUW; we should all be so proud of what AAUW organization is doing and the impact we have in so many areas!

The live Speech Trek Final Competition with the topic of "Gender Bias and Inequality" was amazing to see the young student's knowledge and poise. The announcement of next year's topic: "Is it time to pass the Equal Rights Amendment?"

There was a new event Open Space theme in "Empowering Each Other: Sharing Our Wisdom" in which a variety of circles of engagement depending on interest occurred; most thought they received a great deal of value in this event.

Shannon Smith-Crowley, AAUW CA Legislative Advocate provided an update on the various legislation going on in California, with AAUW-CA focusing on 10 pending bills. (See website)

Alien Rizo was a fabulous speaker for the Public Policy luncheon., a Fair Pay Advocate who currently has a federal lawsuit pending against Fresno County Office of Education over pay inequity which is based on her being a Partnership Liaison for the AIMS Center for Math and Science Education whereby her Math degree and two masters in Educational Technology and Math Education still found her with a gap of \$20,000/year lower than males who were not as qualified. She has been instrumental in recent state legislation too. She is a mother of three young daughters with her husband being a house Dad. Her husband and her were determine not to have what happen to her, happen to their daughters. It has taken a huge financial toll, but AAUW LAF is helping her with some of her legal representations. It was a pleasure to meet her.

Some Half Moon Bay branch members attended, including our own President, Mary Alice Pierce. Maura served as Snapshot editor during this convention. Thanks to all who volunteered! 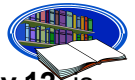
