The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund #9170: What is it and what does it do?



Eleanor Roosevelt was First Lady of the United States from March 1933 to April 1945; she was also one of the First Ladies to work tirelessly for social reforms, but even more important, she was a social activist. She advocated for improved employment opportunities for women and minorities.

Established in 1989, the AAUW Eleanor Roosevelt Fund Award honors an individual, project, organization, or institution for outstanding contributions to equality and education for women and girls. This year's recipient, Linda T. Alepin, lives and works in the Bay Area! A graduate of Stanford University, she is Dean's Executive Professor of Leadership at Santa Clara University.

As Maura Jones has so ably reported, she represented our branch at the AAUW National Convention in New Orleans in May, 2013, Eleanor's Top 10 Reasons to Join Us in New Orleans was a hook used to entice members like Maura to attend. A few favorites were: "You'll have your palm or tarot cards read without leaving the building," "Nothing induces goose bumps quite like an auditorium full of women chanting, 'Lilly, Lilly, Lilly!'" and "Nowhere else can you experience workshops like Retention Is for Rock Stars: Get a Backstage Pass."

On Nov. 18, local writer and activist, Brigid O'Farrell, author of She Was One of Us, Eleanor Roosevelt and the American Worker, will talk about Eleanor's lifelong commitment to women and to the U.S. labor movement. (Please refer to page 1 for more information about this important meeting.)

Public Policy—AFFORDABLE CARE ACT (ACA) aka "Obama Care"

AAUW supports the Affordable Care Act (ACA) passed by Congress in 2010. Two of its provisions most related to AAUW priorities are:

1. A provision that allows young people to be covered under their parents policies up to age 26, and allows coverage, including preventive care, for 25 million uninsured Americans.
2. Another important provision in the ACA ensures women's access to reproductive health services which is a right that women have worked hard to gain 50 years ago.

The AAUW CA Public Policy Priorities for 2013-2015 are:

1. To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women. This includes pay equity and fairness in compensation.
2. To support a strong system of public education. This includes adequate and equitable funding for quality education for all students and vigorous enforcement of Title IX.
3. To guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society. This includes choice in the determination of one's reproductive life and freedom from violence, bullying and sexual harassment.

DID J' KNOW?

One person can make a difference. Sometimes, that person can make a difference over and over again. Edna Leelia Cox was such a person. She started to make a difference early on when she graduated from Washington State University in 1931. In 1942, she joined the US Army Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC). When the US Army Corps realized it needed women officers, Edna was the 334th woman to be commissioned. She served as a purchasing and contract officer, procuring food for troops around the world during World War II, and retired from her military career in 1959 with the rank of Major.

Edna then turned her sights to broadening opportunities for women. When AAUW-HMB was formed in 1967, she enthusiastically joined as a charter member. Throughout her years as a member of the branch, Edna encouraged all members to become involved. If she heard of someone who wanted to join but had financial need, she would anonymously pay their dues so that they could join and make a difference. Edna helped guide branch leadership, not as an elected officer, but as parliamentarian and by-laws chair.

Outside of AAUW, Edna made a difference by serving on the San Mateo County Grand Jury, including one term as foreperson. In addition, she spent 1970-77 lobbying vigorously to secure scenic highway designation for Highway 280 and Highway One, south of Half Moon Bay. She was inducted into the San Mateo County Women's Hall of Fame in 1992. Edna was active in the San Francisco VFW where she served as Post Commander. She was awarded a personal parking space next door to the SF Opera House for several years as a result of her service.

In 1993/94, the branch raised \$25,000 to endow an AAUW Research and Projects (R&P) Grant in her name. It became Edna's most honored recognition. From the endowment, an AAUW R&P Grant is given annually in her name to a recipient chosen by national AAUW. Due to AAUW's place in her heart, Edna bequeathed over \$133,000 to AAUW-HMB when she died at age 92 in 2001.

We received the money in 2004 and established the Edna Cox Fund (ECF). Since this endowment was given without any restrictions or directives for its use, we decided that it should be used to make a difference on the Coastside. Edna L. Cox will be making a difference for a long time to come!

AAUW-HMB Local Scholarships

What an adrenaline rush it was to work the last two hours in the Pumpkin Bread Booth on Sunday of the 2013 Pumpkin Festival. When I arrived, the loaves were all sold. So, those delicious muffins were all we, Peggy, Michelle, and I had to offer. When our "last minute deal of 4 for \$8"—same deal we had offered all day—was announced by the band, the rush was on! Those few muffins that were left at the end of the Fest were sold by Ruth Raffello at our Monday General Meeting. Hurray!

So, once again our Pumpkin Festival Trio--Jennifer Brey, Amy Broome, and Michelle Sansot and all the volunteers have successfully raised funds to be divided between AAUW Funds, Tech Trek, and Local Scholarship. Thank you, everyone for your hard work.

The Pumpkin Festival funds will give our Local Scholarship budget a big boost; however, private donations are still needed to reach our goal of providing two \$2k local scholarships. Remember the third is provided by the Edna Cox Fund. EDNA COX FUND

The ECF Committee met to re-evaluate the policies for the Edna Cox Fund as required by branch policy.

The current procedures were reviewed. The committee's recommendations for use of the funds for the next three-year period [2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-16] are:

Distribute approximately \$7000 annually, by:

Funding a \$2000 Edna Cox Local Scholarship.

Funding a Tech Trek Scholarship (fund at going-rate fee, 2013 was \$900).

Funding up to \$1000 for branch mentoring/tutoring programs, no carry-over.

Funding up to \$3000 for community and/or local school projects, no carry-over.

It was also agreed that upon review and proposal by the ECF committee, additional specific branch projects or needs may be funded on a case-by-case basis, with board approval.

The committee will develop a letter to inform interested applicants about the availability of our funds and the requirements for funding consideration.

The committee will continue to oversee the ECF investments. The American Fund investment contains 66% US equity and 22% US bonds, a good mix. The Bank of America account allows ease of access for current needs.

We will leave from the New Leaf parking lot (just north of the bus stop) at 10:40. We will all chip in for gas and parking, as well as buy our own lunches.

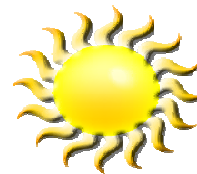

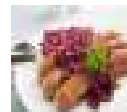
