AAUW Local Scholarship

I recently requested the names of all female graduates for the years of 2014 and 2013 from Half Moon Bay and Pescadero High Schools. This is the first step in the complicated process of selecting 2 Ivania Portocarerro Scholarship, 1 Edna Cox Scholarship, and 1 James and Gloria Dudfield Scholarship recipients.

The Half Moon Bay AAUW Branch has provided scholarships since 1973 when Susan Alves was awarded our first scholarship. In 1976, the branch dedicated the local scholarships in Ivania Portocarerro's memory. Three \$500 scholarships were granted to women in our community who were returning to school under the Branch Program "Project Renew". 3 additional grants of \$75 were awarded to women who were just finishing their degrees. One grant was to our own Katie Murdock. Since 1973, AAUW-HMB has provided educational support to 76 people.

The Edna Cox Fund provides a \$2k scholarship yearly. The Dudfield Estate will provide 7 more scholarships. The Ivania Portocarerro Scholarships are made possible through member fund raising and personal donations. As we near the end of 2016, the committee requests that members consider making donations in support of our Local Scholarships. It is a legacy of which we can all be proud.

It Started with a Dream...

Imagine the Coastside in 1967...just what was it like around here? Highway One was a two lane road with no traffic lights, as was Highway 92 which had no center divide or passing lane. Devil's Slide had few berms or guard rails! Strawflower Shopping Center did not exist, nor did Shoreline Station. There were small markets along the coast for grocery shopping, many of which had butcher shops within. There were few buildings south of Cetrella's, which at that time was a produce loading dock. Ocean Colony and the golf course were farm land. Add to that the fact that answering machines, cell phones and computers were still in the future, making the Coastside an isolated island of a community.

When 26 women gathered in Montara, a town of basically dirt streets, one day in January of 1967, they happily interacted with one another. While they did not necessarily know each other, they were all college graduates with a common interest. Their dream was to start a new branch of the American Association of University Women. It was an opportunity to create a meaningful, but also, social group on the Coastside, where the educated women could meet without having to travel "over the hill".

AAUW-HMB has progressed with the Coastside, making an impact on the culture and development of the area. Our members are active and involved in the community. And while members have come and gone over the last fifty years, AAUW-HMB is still a vibrant and active organization on the Coastside with 153 members.

Public Policy: VOTE ON NOVEMBER 8

On Thursday, Sept. 29th from 10:30-12:30 we went to Sebastian Hart's government classes up at HMBHS. We talked to 2 classes (36 in each class) about AAUW HMB and the various programs we have for students and about the importance of voting. The students were very excited about the prospect of voting and we were able to register 20 students with another 20 still out, to be turned in to Mr. Hart.. This time for the first time 16 and 17 year olds can pre register to vote. The Election Board files these away, and when they are 18 they are good to go. We then went to the HMB Library from 12:30-8:00, and with the help of members Sue Hatfield, Frederick Dyketia, Carol Joyce, Julie Gerth, Peggie Rozhon, Carly Battles, Nancy Evans, Rosemary Malvey, Mary Alice Pearce and Gael Erikson , we were able to register 15 voters , 5 of whom were new citizens and first time voters. As usual, Head Liberian Annie was most helpful.

AAUW Action Fund has compiled a non partisan voter guide of the presidential candidates. We had this guide for you at the General meeting on Oct. 24th, hope you got it. AAUW CA has analyzed the propositions that affect women and girls and have made the following recommendations: YES on 51, 52, 55 and 58 and NO on 53. The League of Women Voters presented un-biased information to us on the 17 Propositions that are on the November ballot at the October General Meeting.

Election Day is Tuesday Nov. 8th encourage everyone to come out and vote..
