AAUW Public Policy

Oct. 15, 2015 will go down in the history books as the date that women will finally get paid the same as men for the same work with the same preparation and experience. Gov. Jerry Brown signed into law SB358. The law, known as the FAIR PAY ACT, was signed at the Rosie the Riveter-WW II Home Front National Historical Park (where the Out and About group will be visiting Friday Nov. 6). Women in California have earned 84 cents to every dollar a man earns while the gap for women of color has been 44 cents. It is said that "as California goes, so does the nation". Let's hope that will be true.

Another measure recently signed by Gov. Brown, insures that California students will get one of the most rounded educations on sex and sexuality in the country. It will be required to be taught once in Middle School and once in High School and will include teaching about birth control and emergency contraception, abstinence, abortion, sexual consent, gender identity and sexual orientation.

AB357, as mentioned in the October Tidings, did not pass. It would have required employers to inform their employees 2 weeks in advance of their work schedules, which would have been a big help for parents planning for babysitting and other activities.
