Our Branch Dues Renewal Fundraiser for 2013 was the most successful ever for our Tech Trek scholarship fund! Each year, a few more members take the opportunity to designate add-on dollars when renewing their branch membership or even write a separate check to support Tech Trek scholarships. During our dues renewal period for the new branch fiscal year 2013-14, \$156 were added to our branch restricted fund earmarked for Tech Trek and — drum roll, please — \$1170 were contributed through larger individual donations sent directly to AAUW-CA Special Project Fund and deposited for our AAUW-HMB campers for July 2014. That's a grand total of \$1326 in this spring/summer effort.



Many thanks to the approximately 35 members who have made these individual, tax-deductible contributions this year to support middle-school girls from the Coastside at the weeklong math and science camp. Individual member contributions account for the largest portion of Tech Trek funding. In addition, branch fundraiser events, such as the White Elephant Sale, the Bluegrass Concert, and the Pumpkin Festival, contribute to our Tech Trek goals. In the case of branch events, Tech Trek receives a percentage of funds raised, sharing the proceeds with our flagship AAUW Funds and our longstanding Local Scholarship Fund. Isn't it gratifying to know we are supporting women and girls from middle-school to the post-graduate level?

Because our Tech Trek camper reservations are due to the AAUW-CA Tech Trek Coordinator each year by OCTOBER 1, it is important to show this level of support by this deadline. The current cost is \$900 per camper, though the fees may rise slightly after the 2013 camp budgets statewide are evaluated. At this juncture, we are secure in funding FIVE girls at Stanford Tech Trek 2014 and we are wait-listed for the sixth, which depends on dorm facilities assigned. Your generous gifts, plus carry-over dollars not utilized last year, and the addition of one scholarship from the branch's Edna Cox Fund make this possible.

DID J' KNOW?

It's Pumpkin Festival time again. Our branch has had the same booth to the right of the IDES Hall since the second year of the festival in 1972. At first we searched for a product to sell, trying pumpkin bars, candy and coffee. But no one sold pizza so we dove in. Harry Herpes (that's not a joke) made and distributed mini pizzas. They were good and sold as fast as we could bake them. Harry provided the ovens stacked three high in three rows. They required heavy duty extension cords which we taped to the ground and plugged in inside the IDES Hall. Locating the cords and the plugs was always a challenge. About ten members at a time did three hour shifts. It took an army. Long potholder gloves gave some protection but burns were common. If you wore glasses they fogged over every time you opened an oven. We did this for a lot of years!

When the HMB Historical Society gave up selling pumpkin bread, we jumped at the chance for a change. For two years we baked and wrapped about 500 loaves in the kitchen of the Methodist Church. Then Ann Von Thaden took over and found a bakery which baked, wrapped and froze the bread for us. This year Full Bloom Bakery was sold and told us that they would no longer be able to make our bread. Stand by and learn where our wonderful bread is being baked this year and where it is being stored until Pumpkin Festival time.

Half Moon Bay Chamber of Commerce Education Committee

The first meeting of the C of C Education Committee was full of good news. Under the leadership of Len Erickson, the STEM Robotics afterschool program will be funded for the 3rd year by the City of Half Moon Bay. It is the 5th year of the program being supported by the Chamber. Cabrillo Unified School District has hired a consultant to analyze data for the new comprehensive strategy plan. Seacrest has a new principal and will soon have completed a new addition to the campus. Cabrillo Education Fund has met the goal of \$2.6M to support public education. The Square Peg Organization is planning a 10 week paid intern program to provide respite for the parents of challenged students who participate at Square Peg. Sonrisas screened the teeth of 1300 children last school year. The program has been approved for an \$80K three year grant.

AAUW-HMB continues to participate as a member of this important committee.

EDNA COX FUND

The Edna Cox Fund (ECF) was established in 2004 with the purpose of making a difference on the Coastside. The money (over \$133,000) was bequeathed to AAUW-HMB by Edna Cox, a branch charter member. She died in 2001 at the age of 92.

The 2010-13 guidelines state: distribute approximately \$6000 annually, including a \$2000 Edna Cox Local Scholarship and a \$900 Edna Cox Tech Trek (TT) Scholarship. In addition to the scholarships, up to \$1000 available for the branch's high school mentoring/tutoring programs and up to \$2000 to local school outreach.

The 2012-13 ECF committee chose to fund the following for local school outreach (there was no expenditure for mentoring/tutoring):

Working with Jessica Ormond, HMB High School Library Technician, a new printer/copy machine for student use in the library was purchased (\$600.)

Working with Natalie Zisko, principal of El Granada Elementary School, 150 books to use in their guided reading program, which encompasses all grades, were purchased from Bay Book Company in HMB, who gave a 15% discount. The books are aligned to the theme of female empowerment and determination. (\$1999.48)

Working with Mary Vargas and Gael Erickson, a one-day STEM program for middle-school girls was funded and held at Cunha Middle School in the summer. Coastside Tech Trek girls who did not get chosen to go to the Stanford TT attended this program. (\$320)

LET'S TALK ABOUT AAUW FUNDS



How does a branch establish a Research & Project Grant Endowment?

One of the most exciting and inspirational things to happen when I was branch president was accepting an award at the California State Convention in 2004 for our branch's total funds contributed to the Educational Foundation (now known as AAUW Funds). We were one of the top ten branches in the state! How did this happen? Because our branch sought to honor one of our charter members, the godmother of our branch, Ruth Rafello.

It's fairly simple to start a Research & Project Grant Endowment. An individual, branch or state can pay tribute to an outstanding member by establishing an endowment. (A chart including type of fellowship or grant, amount of money to be raised and time frame may be found at www.aauw.org/resource/establish-an-endowed-fund/.)

Then it takes the dedication of every branch member to make it happen. The money we earned through our pumpkin bread sales at the Pumpkin Festival, plus \$10,000 from the Edna Cox Fund and individual contributions, allowed us to complete Ruth's endowment in record time.

How fortunate we are not only to have completed an endowment for Ruth, but also for Ruth's friend and mentor, Edna Cox, before her. But it doesn't stop there. Every year our branch contributes money raised through our fund-raising events and individual contributions. Last year, California alone accounted for nearly \$600,000 contributed to AAUW Funds nationally! And that money goes to the myriad programs, grants and fellowships supported by our national organization.

STEM WORKSHOP IN JULY

On Tuesday, July 16 a one day STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) workshop was held for Cunha Middle School girls who had not been selected for Tech Trek. Eleven girls signed up. Gael Erickson and Carlos Vargas were the teachers and Julie Gerth and Mary Vargas were the coordinators. In the morning we went for an Ecosystem and Geological walk to the Main Street Bridge. During the walk, the girls took photos with iPads of various ecosystems. We returned to Cunha for snacks and then began classifying rocks as to whether they were igneous, sedimentary or metamorphic. After lunch, we looked at cereal boxes and juice bottles and boxes in order to compare the nutritional values. At the end of the day, the girls shared the iPad photos they had taken in the morning.

We hope to extend this successful STEM workshop to 3 days next summer. I would like to thank the Edna Cox Committee for the funds that made it possible for us to conduct this workshop for the Middle School girls interested in Math and Science.

Public Policy

What is happening to **Title IX**, **the Civil Rights Act of 1964**? This is a Federal Law that prohibits discrimination in employment or educational facilities based on sex, race, color, national origin and/or religion. As you can see,this Act is not just about equality for women and girls in sports offerings. AAUW has been a supporter of Title IX since its inception 40 years ago. Fearing it has been ignored in recent years, AAUW CA is concentrating its efforts this year at the State Convention in April to remind people of what it is and how it needs to continue to be implemented.

Fair Pay Act celebrated 50 years on June 10, 2013. The **Paycheck Fairness Act** has been reintroduced in the House and Senate. In the AAUW publication, <u>Graduation to a Pay Gap</u>, it was found that college educated women are still paid 7% less than men one year out of college. AAUW has asked President Obama to enact part of the Fair Paycheck Act now through executive order.

Did you know that approximately 26,000 sexual assaults occur in the military each year? In April 2013 the **Sexual Assault Training Oversite and Prevention Act (STOP)** was reintroduced by Rep. Jackie Speier. AAUW strongly supports this legislation. This would create an independent office that would investigate and prosecute sexual assault cases in the military. A documentary film <u>,The Invisible War</u>, addresses this problem.

Section 4 of the **Voting Rights Act** has been invalidated by the Supreme Court (Shelby County vs. Holder). Section 4 contains a formula prescribing which states and jurisdictions, with a history of discrimination against minority voters, can obtain Federal pre-clearance before implementing any changes to their voting laws. This invalidation of Section 4 essentially nullifies a core provision of the Voting Rights Act. Senator Diane Feinstein and the Senate Judiciary Committee are working to restore these protections.
