AAUW Public Policy

AAUW supports Planned Parenthood. Planned Parenthood has been in the news lately with attacks on fetal tissue donations. These donations occur only with a woman's consent, is not a profit-making venture and does not involve federal funds. AAUW is a long time supporter of reproductive rights. AAUW has joined 92 organizations in signing a letter to Congress informing them that we stand with Planned Parenthood and the women they serve everyday. We have also joined 96 organizations on a coalition letter opposing congressional efforts to de fund Planned Parenthood and sent out own letter to the "Hill" urging a "NO" vote.

On the state level. AAUW CA considered over 80 bills and decided to focus on bills that impact women economically. These include:

1. ADC50: Recognizing April 14 as EQUAL PAY DAY in California.

2. AB 1017 : Would break the cycle of low, discriminatory wages by prohibiting employers from using salary history to determine a job applicant's new salary

3. AB357: Would require a food and general retail establishment to provide employees with at least two weeks notice of their work schedule.

4. SB3 : Would raise the minimum wage in California.

5. SB23: Would repeal the Maximum Family Grant limitations for CalWorks recipients.

6. SB38: Would allow a state earned income tax credit, if the credit exceeds the tax liability, to be refunded.

7. SB358: Would prohibit an employer from paying any of its employees at a wage rate less than those paid to employees of the opposite sex for the same work, with the same training and experience.

Adult learners may participate in study abroad programs as well. Florence is the first program offered from January 30-April 29, 2016. Grants are available for high school teachers who wish to develop internationally based curriculum for their students.
