AAUW FUNDS UPDATE

In May, the following members received Century Awards for donating \$100 or more: June Baxter, Marguerite Kaufman, Judy O'Leary, and Judy Taylor. Century Awards donations can be made in one or several installments. The state office in Sacramento reported all HMB donations for the first two quarters of 2016 at \$4, 377. \$3, 950 was designated for Tech Trek.

In 2015, California AAUW members donated \$707,524 to AAUW Funds. For the first quarter of 2016, \$899,329 has already been donated by California branches. This large amount reflects Tech Trek donations now that AAUW National is administering the Tech Trek program for California, rather than the Special Projects Fund. All donations to Tech Trek processed by National are credited to branch donations, unlike previously when National didn't receive the money.

For the academic 2016-17 year, more than 230 women and community projects serving women and girls will receive \$3.7 million from AAUW Funds. 43% of these fellowships and grants support women in STEM fields. All our modest checks when combined can make huge impacts in our society. Applications for the grants and fellowships for 2017-18 opened on Aug.1, 2016.

STEM CAMP REPORT

A four day STEM Camp was held for 7th grade girls on July 12-15 at HMB High School. Twelve girls attended along with four helpers from the high school.

We visited the Water Treatment Plant and learned where our water comes from and how it is purified. We built spaghetti bridges, programmed robots, and built our "dream house". Annie came from the library with the 3D printer and we made 3D "selfies". We walked to Oddyssea. We made and tested catapults. We walked to Frances State Beach where we learned the geology and ecology of the area and bird watched with member Ranger Nel Lyons. We learned how to measure electrical energy and took apart several electrical components with engineer Lauren Williams.

Each day the girls took photos with iPads provided by member Maura Jones. With these photos, they made a short slide presentation which you will see at our November 21st meeting.

On the last day of camp, a panel of women in STEM professions came and talked about their backgrounds and professions. Thanks to all the members who came and helped walk with the girls, drive and pick up our lunches and especially the team who worked with me since April, Gael Erikson, Julie Gerth and Carlos Vargas. Thanks to the Edna Cox Fund for making this STEM Camp possible. Come to the Nov. 21st meeting to meet some of the girls, try out several of the activities and view the slide presentations the participants made.

Public Policy

In this important election year, we must be ever mindful of the propaganda we are bombarded with by both politicians, the media and mailers. We need to look at the voting records of our representatives and each party's platform and judge if it helps promote issues that affect women and girls.

AAUW CA has carefully analyzed the state propositions and recommends the following:

PROP 51: School bonds for K-12 schools and Community Colleges

PROP 52: Medical funding

PROP 55: Extend taxes for schools voted in in PROP. 30

PROP 58: California Multilingual Education Act for structured Bilingual Education for English Learners

Oppose:

PROP 53 Voter approval on specific bonds

The Fall edition of Perspective, coming out in September will have a complete analysis of these issues.

On Monday Oct 24th at our General meeting we will have a speaker from the League of Women Voters speaking to all these propositions and more. We meet at 7PM at the Methodist Church Hall in Half Moon Bay.

The Equal Pay Day Resolution (ACR 155 Campos) will be up for a vote in the CA Senate (it passed in the Assembly) This resolution is sponsored by AAUW CA. Many AAUW members attended this monumental vote for women and girls. The next issue of the Tidings will carry the results of this vote and who voted for and against it.

We will begin registering voters for the November election as part of the "Get Out The Vote" CA AAUW project. A group of us will be going to Canada College on Aug. 30 to help the San Carlos AAUW branch register young voters.. We plan to do some voter registration here on the coast also. 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
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Interest Group Coordinator Message:
