We have invited 3 community members to be our contest judges. The top contestant will be entered into the state AAUW Speech Trek competition, which will be held at the AAUW CA state convention which will be held April 15-17 in San Mateo. This event is always the high light of the whole 3 days, which is even more reason to attend the convention! The top 3 winners state wide will each receive a cash award. BRANCH BUSINESS:

It's a Leap Year — and our branch has grown by leaps and bounds! AAUW-HMB branch membership is the highest it has been in over 20 years, thanks to the strong, three-year effort of Membership V.P. Mary Sheridan, assisted this year by Co-V.P. Peggy Rozhon, and the appeal of our mission to advance equity for women and girls.

We are 158 members strong!

Running an organization of this size — providing substantive programs with speakers in hospitable meeting rooms that welcome the wider community, managing our scholarship programs, supporting our officers who keep us linked to state and national AAUW initiatives, and communicating through our Tidings newsletter — requires member support through local dues, currently \$21. (As you know, the National portion is \$49 with \$46 of it tax-deductible; AAUW-CA \$20.)

With advice from Treasurer Helen Paul, the Board has decided it is time to ask the membership to consider a dues increase — the first in 20 years! Our General Fund must keep up with the needs of our growing organization. The Board voted at its January 2016 meeting to raise annual dues by \$10. (Remember, our dues are now tax-deductible too.)

This issue will come before the entire membership for a vote in the spring. Before then, please feel free to ask questions of board members, as we are anxious to engage our members in this process. We look forward to seeing you at the next meeting.

Public Policy:

Oct. 29,2015 is a new term for the US Supreme Court. This coming year of 2016 will see a serious challenge to affirmative action, new threats to contraception access and a potential watershed case for reproductive rights.

Fisher v University of Texas brings the discussion of affirmative action back. A white student has filed a suit against the university challenging its use of race-conscious admissions after the top 10% of high school seniors are automatically admitted. The Supreme Court is expected to hear this case which will affect affirmative action programs through out the US.

The "Hobby Lobby" case. The 8th Circut of Appeals ruled that Hobby Lobby will not have to provide their employees with contraception through their employee health plan siting religious opposition.. This ruling has been challenged by the Right to Choose group and the Supreme Court is expected to hear this case on appeal.

A number of states have passed the TRAP (targeted regulation of abortion) laws, provides to restrict or element a woman's access to legal abortions. The Supreme Court is currently considering whether it will hear challenges to the TRAP law.

AAUW- HMB Local Scholarship

I am happy to report that as a result of the early mailing, I have already received one application for our Local Scholarship.

Because of your generosity and hard work on fund raising our funds will again provide two \$2k Ivania Portocarerro scholarships. Edna Cox Funds will provide another. A gift from the estate of Gloria Dudfield will provide another for this year and one each for several more years. The scholarship will be named in honor of James and Gloria Dudfield.

The scholarship committee will meet in April to determine the four recipients of the scholarships. These scholarships would not be possible without the support of our members who believe in supporting higher education for women.

2015 Tech Trekkers Explore Wide Range of Topics in Science Fair

What fun to see the science projects of our 2015 Tech Trekkers at the annual, eighth-grade Cunha Science Fair — truly a rite of passage on the Coastside.

The Cunha gym was packed on Jan. 13 as families and friends roamed the aisles of colorful displays summarizing data from a wide range of experiments in behavioral, physical, earth and life science. Our six Tech Trekkers covered the whole range of categories — and each earned a ribbon! Four will go on to the county competition.

- **Jamie M.** received a first-place award in the Physical Science category for her project entitled, "Polygon Parachutes." She wanted to find out what parachute shape is best. She controlled for the surface area of

each parachute at 900 sq. cm. as well as the weight attached to the parachutes so the independent variable could be the shape. She tested 5 different shapes: triangle, square, pentagon, hexagon and octagon. The octagonal parachute slowed a falling weight most.

-Top science fair honors and a first-place award went to **Sonya C.**, whose pastime is sailing. Her love of the ocean and concern for marine life inspired her to look at "Ghost Fishing" and to ask the question, "Which automated release system material (hemp, jute, nylon or cotton) will break first?" Lost fishing nets and traps continue to ensnare and kill fish worldwide. She wanted to find out which material would break down most easily thereby allowing marine animals to escape and survive. She created a frame of wire and strands of the four materials and submerged them in the harbor for 32 days. Her conclusion was that hemp would be best for the marine environment, as it breaks down first.

-Melissa G. was also drawn to the sea and local tide pools. She asked, "Does the temperature of the tide pool water affect hermit crab activity?" and received a second-place ribbon for her observations. She hypothesized that hermit crabs were more active in warmer water, but her experiment showed that was not necessarily the case. She suspects the salinity of the water may have a greater effect. -Kendall M. went into her kitchen to study yeast and earned a second-place ribbon. Her experiment was entitled, "Pour Some Sugar On Me" as she explored "how different sugar sources affect the pH and rise of bread." She says if you want a light and fluffy bread dough, you need white sugar. (Honey had the biggest change in pH, from 5 to 7.)

-Mia G. took up the difficult area of Behavioral Science and enlisted 37 human subjects to explore "How Different Genres of Music Affect Memory." She received a third-place ribbon. She had heard of research on the "Mozart Effect" and wanted to see if listening to music while reading allowed people to recall material better.

- Madison S. earned an honorable mention ribbon with her Behavioral Science question, "How Hard Is It to Cheat?" and examined the issue of plagiarism. She was also recently honored by her teachers as Student of

the Month.

Many observers noted that girls dominated the podium at the awards ceremony this year. Congratulations to all of our 2015 Tech Trekkers! We are so proud of them!
