Education, Here and Now



AAUW's mission statement reads as follows: "Advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research."

January's speaker will give us insight into educational opportunities for young women right here, in our own district, with particular regard to STEM and Title IX.

Superintendent Jane Yuster heads up the Cabrillo Unified School District. We have invited her to speak to us about Title IX, particularly with regard to how it works in our district. Part of the Education Amendments of 1972, Title IX states: "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

There is a perception that Title IX only applies to sports, but athletics is only one key area addressed by the law. The other areas are: access to higher education; career education, education for pregnant and parenting

students, employment, learning environment, math and science, sexual harassment, standardized testing and technology.

We hope you will join us for this informative evening about educational opportunities for women here and now.

AAUW National: A Year of Successes

Happy holidays! With your support, it's been a banner year for AAUW. Thanks for helping us achieve so many successes, including:

- Helping 40 states and the District of Columbia introduce or consider pay-equity legislation, with six to passing laws California, Connecticut, Hawaii, New Jersey, Vermont and Washington.
- Joining Kansas City Mayor Sly James and the Women's Foundation to launch Work Smart in Kansas City, the first phase of a large-scale initiation to train one million women to negotiate for better salaries across Kansas and Missouri.
- Launching the free online version of Work Smart, which is instrumental in our efforts to close the gender pay gap by 2030.
- Supporting plaintiff Aileen Rizo in Rizo v. Fresno County Office of Education, a critical court decision in the fight for

equal pay. In April, after AAUW joined an amicus brief to help move the case forward, the Ninth Circuit ruled that using prior salary alone wasn't enough to justify a wage differential – a huge leap forward in addressing compensation inequity.

We're setting our sights even higher for 2019. This year, we'll prioritize continue to economic security of all women and ensure that business leaders. educators and lawmakers do the same. And we'll work closely with the members of the 116th Congress – a record number of whom are women – to adopt a robust equity agenda. We're deeply appreciative of your continued support of AAUW's mission and we are so proud that you stand with us!

We hear about the gender gap all the time — in salary, in math and science fields, in leadership. But one of the most glaring and long-standing gaps is in the art world. For centuries women artists were unrecognized, discouraged or even discredited simply because they were not men.

Today, things have changed – some. Still, as of 2012, only 4 percent of artists on display at the Metropolitan Museum of Art were women. There remains just one major museum in the world dedicated solely to women artists. That's why we host an annual art contest to give women artists the equal attention they deserve.

College of San Mateo is running a "Career and Workforce Hub" to bridge the gap between employers and students by providing students with career exploration and preparation services, and working with businesses to create internships and employment placement.

The State of California has a substantial budget surplus. Cabrillo Unified School District Superintendent Jane Yuster has requested that we bug Governor-elect Gavin Newsom about using that surplus for "full and fair funding" for the schools according to Prop. 98, which was passed in 1988. California presently ranks 46th in the nation on school funding.

What's Happening with Title IX?

Title IX was signed into law by President Richard Nixon in 1972. It protects people from gender-based discrimination in educational programs or activities that receive federal assistance. Besides offering all programs to all students, this can include sexual assault, relationship abuse, stalking and sexual harassment.

Education Secretary Betsy DeVos intends to rescind Obama-era Title IX guidance that many survivors feel could unfairly shield those accused of sexual misconduct.

The biggest change included in the Department of Education's interim guidance is that it allows universities to modify the standard of evidence in campus assault cases. The new guidance allows schools to move from a preponderance of evidence model to a "clear and convincing standard" of proof. The sentence in such cases does not necessarily carry legal complications, but can lead to school disciplinary actions and expulsion.

It will be interesting to continue to monitor these proposed changes to Title IX.

Sale date: Saturday, June 1


Setup dates: Thursday and Friday, May 30 and 31

A Collaborative Initiative

AAUW, the Friends of the Commission on the Status of Women, and the San Francisco Commission on the Status of Women launched a large-scale, grassroots initiative

to teach 20,000 women by 2020 to negotiate their salaries and benefits packages with confidence. The initiative also aims to help close the gender pay gap in San Francisco.

men in the San Francisco metro area were \$76,502 compared with \$63,306 for women earnings ratio of just 83 percent. And for most women. the gap pay wider. Latinas working San Francisco are paid 40 cents for every dollar white, non-Hispanic men are paid;

African-American women 51 cents; and Asian-American women 65 cents.


