Tom Delay of Texas.



AAUW California Convention Volunteering and Days for Girls Hygiene Kits

The *California Perspective* newsletter will arrive soon with detailed information about the

state convention, which will be held locally April 17-19. Not only will there be an opportunity to attend and be inspired, but to volunteer. By volunteering for five hours during the three days of convention, you will be credited with \$120 off registration costs. Tasks include things such as collecting evaluations from workshops, collecting dinner tickets, registration assistance, being a greeter or directing attendees.

On Saturday, April 18, during the plenary session, there will be a hands-on project compiling items

for a Days for Girls Hygiene Kit. This was designed by **Celeste Mergens**

when she learned that, in several countries, girls were not able to go to



school or engage in meaningful work during their menses. Instead, they are confined to their rooms or to a shed away from the public eye. They fall

> behind in their school work and eventually drop out. The kits created at convention will be distributed through the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to Rwanda Refugee Camps.

Our Support of AAUW National through AAUW Funds

As a branch, we made a \$6,000 donation to AAUW Funds in 2019. The funds for our gift were raised our 2019 through fundraisers: Theater Bash, Coastside Gives, White Elephant Sale and Pumpkin Festival. Many thanks to the volunteers who made these fundraisers possible and the branch members and community members who supported them.

I also want to thank our members who donated directly to the AAUW Fund. Through the third quarter of 2019, individual members donated a total of \$1,395.

Our donation to the AAUW Fund was split between several of the new

fund categories implemented in 2019. We donated \$4,500 to the Greatest Needs Fund, which allows AAUW the flexibility to respond rapidly to new and emerging challenges facing women and girls and to utilize gifts where they're needed most. The remaining \$1,500 was divided equally between the following funds:

- Education and Training Addressing the barriers and implicit bias that hinder the advancement of women
- Economic Security Ensuring livelihoods for women
- Leadership Closing the gender gap in leadership opportunities

The AAUW Funds Committee composed of **Carol Joyce**, VP AAUW Funds; **Diana Kalos**, past VP AAUW Funds; **Mary Alice Pearce** and **Mary Sheridan** decided how the donation would be divided among the new fund categories.

Once again, I want to acknowledge all the effort and support that enables our branch to support AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research.

When this interest group began in 2004, June Baxter, president at the time, asked Cornelia Gould, who was active in Great Decisions in another

branch, to lead the group. Two members **GREAT DECISIONS** who initially started in the group are still participating today. It's a popular interest group AAUW in several throughout branches the nation.

The Foreign Policy Association annually compiles and publishes a book called Great Decisions with eight subjects of

international relevance. This organization was founded with a distinguished group of academics and journalists who were sensing the need to rally public support for President Woodrow Wilson's vision for a new world order. In the early 1920s, FPA decided that it should not seek to influence foreign policy decisions directly, but to focus instead on public education. Currently, its mission is



inseparable from America's role in the world.

The topics covered in 2019 were global migration, Middle East,

> nuclear negotiations, nationalism in Europe, trade with China, cyber conflict. U.S. and Mexico and the state of diplomacy. These articles were written by experts chosen by FPA to inform the reader on topical facts.


