President's Message Women Have Had the Right to Vote for 100 Years

Prior to 1776, women had the right to vote in several of the colonies in what would become the United States, but by 1807 every state constitution denied even limited suffrage.

In 1848 the movement for women's rights launched on a national level with the Seneca Falls Convention organized bv Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Mott. 19th Lucretia The Amendment the U.S. to Constitution granted American women the right to vote, a right known as women's suffrage, and was ratified on Aug. 18, 1920, ending almost a century of protest.

California AAUW does not sanction in-person meetings during COVID-19. We will be continuing board and general meetings through Zoom. If anyone has problems with Zoom please call someone in the group. Some of our interest groups are meeting via Zoom.

Big Lift Collaborative

Education on the Coastside has become far more difficult during this time of pandemic.

Because the schools were closed, the Big Lift summer program could not meet with K-3 children, but those served by the program were provided with workbooks.

The HMB Library provided STEM kits, free books, and curbside pickups of ordered books. Coastside Childrens' Program provided limited child care in August for small groups of children who could safely distance. Limited day care will be provided in the fall for qualifying families.

Big Lift Collaborative has continued to meet during the summer to discuss solutions to the problems of inequity with remote learning. Cabrillo will begin school with remote learning, but many families do not have adequate wi-fi to ensure internet connections. The Coastside has notoriously bad wi-fi connections. Imagine a large family in crowded rooms with limited resources and extremely limited technology trying to meet the needs of K-12 students at the same time.

At the most recent meeting on Aug. 4, members of the collaborative discussed the possibility of partnerships with business and the San Mateo County Office of Education to tackle what seems like an insurmountable task of educating the youngsters of our community. Our future actually depends on educating our kids.

Updates from Tech Trek Alumnae

Though the pandemic prevented us from sending a new cohort of Coastside girls to Tech Trek at Stanford in 2020, we still enjoy hearing from some of the 100-plus Tech Trek alums who are pursuing college degrees and careers all across the country. Branch members who were on our June branch Zoom event got to see and hear from Laura Vollmer, TT 1999, who is doing research in childhood obesity at the UC Nutrition Policy Institute; Shelly Schabinger, TT 2010, who was enthusiastic about her job in the San Mateo County Coroner's Office as a forensics technician; and Jackie 2011. who Lopez, ΤT just graduated from UCLA. Jackie just followed up in August to let us know she arrived in Ithaca, NY, and is ready to begin her PhD program in chemistry.

Recent high school class of 2020 graduates sent greetings too: **Melissa Godoy**, TT 2015, writes that she is going to study environmental science at UCSB; **Mia Griffiths** is planning to attend and swim competitively in Division I at Eastern Illinois University; and **Sonya Cullen** will study nursing at Arizona State University. She said the current arrangement allows her to live in the dorms, but with flex online/in-person classes.

Recent notices to the *Half Moon Bay Review* listed **Julie Raffetto**, TT 2014, on the dean's list at Northeastern University. Her fellow Tech Trekker **Michaela McGee** was named to the spring semester dean's honor roll at University of Wyoming.

And here's a newsy note from **Angelica Haro**, TT 2010:

"... It is a crazy time to be currently enrolled as a nursing student! I am now finishing up my third semester in nursing school at CSU Chico (only one year to go!). We weren't allowed into the hospital to finish our clinical rotations for the second half of this semester, and I unfortunately wasn't able to make it to a labor and delivery nor a pediatrics unit as I was supposed to. Luckily, though, we were able to finish our hours through an online format. We provided various hours of education presentations to pregnant mothers and children ages 6-12 years old in our Chico community.

"A crucial part of nursing is educating the patient. I felt as though it almost gave us an experience with practicing telehealth! And, of course, as nurses we have to learn how to be flexible — anything can happen during our shift, just as pandemics can come at unplanned times like these into our world!"

Not only did some of these Tech Trekkers go on to serve as counselors at Tech Trek when they were in high school, but some have helped us with local fundraising events and have been generous Coastside Gives donors. We are so proud of all these young women.

A widespread protest movement has emerged in 2020, clearly and loudly demanding greater racial equity through systemic change. This protest movement is in line with the core mission of AAUW: "To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy." How are these two aligned? AAUW's central mission statement implies a focus on *all* women and girls. To achieve this mission, we must demand greater equity for Black women and girls.

At the national level, AAUW has acknowledged that the organization

Black and other minority women would not gain the right to vote until President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Although the act aimed to eliminate these practices, gerrymandering and other voter suppression techniques continue to threaten all Americans' right to the elective franchise. has historically fallen short of this goal, as it has lacked diversity and inclusion in leadership, membership and focus. AAUW has taken concrete steps to create organizational change to better address its mission of serving all women.

Individual AAUW members can also take concrete steps to make sure that the inclusive mission of AAUW is made into a reality — here with a specific focus on racial equity for Black women and girls. One way this can be done is through white members learning about and engaging in anti-racism and white allyship.

Anti-racism is the active practice of calling out racism when it is encountered, which may include having uncomfortable conversations about race and racism in everyday life. Non-racism, the internal and often silent opposition to racism, is positive, but it is not enough to create necessary change. Related to antiracism is white allyship. White allies are people who make the long-term commitments and efforts necessary to recognize their racially based privilege and who continually work in solidarity with oppressed groups engaged in institutional and political struggles for justice.

In addition to her behind-thescenes work as treasurer, Vivian was also honored for generously sharing her excellent baking skills to provide desserts for numerous branch functions including the Johnston House tea, 50th anniversary bash, theater fundraisers and holiday and scholarship luncheons. Every day there seems to be something new in the

news. On top of the list is finding a vaccine for the coronavirus, Black Lives Matter, school openings, the economy, the upcoming November election, and the controversial mail-in ballots.

Here in California, all registered voters will be sent a ballot to vote and return by mail. We have recently heard from the new Postmaster General that mail may take longer to be delivered, because he is eliminating overtime for postal workers.



President Trump has just stated that he will not put

more money into the budget for USPS so that ballots are sent and received in time to be counted. Trump has stated that by holding out on more money, it will discourage mail-in voting. My advice would be to mail in your ballot at least two weeks early or, better yet, take into the election office on Tower Road.
