Local Voting Information

All ballots for the Nov. 3 California general election will be mailed to voters by Oct. 5.

As the result of a new law passed this year, state election officials must accept mail-in ballots that arrive up to 17 days after Election Day, so long as they are postmarked by Nov. 3.

The deadline to register to vote is Oct. 19. Same-day voter registration, known as conditional voter registration in state law, is a safety net for Californians who miss the deadline to register to vote or update their voter registration information.

Eligible citizens who need to register or re-register to vote within 14 days of an election can complete the same-day process at their county elections office, polling place or Vote Center. Their ballots will be processed and counted after the elections county office has completed the voter registration verification process. You can register (or re-register) and vote at the same time at any Vote Center all the way through Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 3.

Beginning Oct. 5, voted ballots may be placed in any secure ballot drop box location throughout San Mateo County. Coastside locations include: • Inside New Leaf Community Market, 150 San Mateo Road (available during regular business hours only).

• Outside Half Moon Bay City Hall, 501 Main St.

At San Mateo County Vote Centers you can register to vote, vote in person, return a voted ballot or request a replacement ballot.

The following three Vote Centers will be open from Oct. 5 through Nov. 2 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Nov. 3 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.:

• Assessor/County Clerk/ Recorder, 555 County Center, Redwood City.

• Registration & Elections Division, 40 Tower Road, San Mateo.

• Main Library, 840 W. Orange Ave., South San Francisco.

The Big Lift Collaborative continues to meet each month even though the summer program had to be cancelled because of COVID-19. Educators on the Coast are working remotely to meet the educational needs of our children. The THE educational community now, of course, includes librarians parents. childcare and providers, who are all working support to education.

San Mateo County Libraries is providing extensive support and allocating internet hotspots to those in need. Check our local Half Moon Bay Library **website** for details. Children are even able to sign up to read to a nonjudgmental, patient dog

AAUW Fund Virtual Luncheon: Register Now

We hope you saved the dates for the AAUW Fund Virtual Lunch with AAUW fellows and grant recipients. The lunches will be held via Zoom on Saturday, Oct. 10, and Saturday, Oct. 24. Both webinars will begin at 1 p.m. Each lunch will have a different speaker so feel free to register for both here.

In order to motive you to register for the lunches, here is background information on AAUW fellowships and grants as well as the women who received the three research and project grants funded by AAUW Half Moon Bay and awarded by AAUW National.

Overview

AAUW has a long history of helping women pursue their education. Overall, AAUW has given more than \$115 million to more than 13,000 women and nonprofit organizations around the world. In 2019-20, 259 women and community projects received fellowships and grants and \$3.5 million in fellowship and grants were awarded for the 2020-21 academic year. The funding helps ease the burden of student debt, which disproportionately affects women, so that promising women can excel in their fields and become leaders in business, government, academia, community activism, the arts and sciences.

There are seven types of fellowships and grants available. I will focus here on Career Development Grants, which were awarded to recipients of the three grants funded by AAUW Half Moon Bay. More information can be found on AAUW's website.

Career Development Grants

Career Development Grants were established in 1972 to offer "encouragement" funding to renew or resume academic work for credit toward career or employment advancement. Today, grants provide funding to women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance or change careers or re-enter the workforce in education, health and medical sciences or social sciences. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields. Funds are used to support course work beyond a bachelor's degree, including a *Continued on page 7*

master's degree, second bachelor's degree, certification program or specialized training in technical or professional fields. Funds are not available for doctorate work.

resides in Riverside. According to AAUW's website, Denise wishes to expand her expertise by diving into meaningful plant ecophysiology research aimed at understanding the strategies plants employ to tolerate drought and heat across ecosystems. With a sound knowledge base and university ties established, she will then create an engaging plant ecology course for high-school students, with the goal of providing the necessary kev instruction in relevant environmental-science topics amid today's critically changing climate.

Half Moon Bay **Ruth Rafello** Grant: **Karen Waters** is the 2020-21



recipient of a c a r e e r development grant funded in part by the Ruth Rafello G r a n t . According to A A U W 's website, Karen

resides in Glendale and is a former journalist whose beat was institutional finance. She worked for Morningstar as an editor and subsequently was directory editor of Pensions Investments and newspaper. She currently works as a director of human resources. Waters aspires to a career in aviation as a pilot. She will use her skills to unify the goals of diversity, equity and inclusion within the aviation community. particularly among Black female pilots.

Last year's recipient of the Ruth Rafello Grant, **Jazmyne Gill**, was scheduled to speak at our April meeting that was cancelled because of COVID-19.

Half Moon Bay 50th Anniversary Grant: **Tesa Tapuriah** is the 2020-21 recipient of a career development grant funded in part by the Half Moon Bay 50th Anniversary grant. According to AAUW's website, Tesa is a vocational specialist at Oahu's only residential substance-abuse treatment facility for women and their infant children. While fulfilling her



role at the facility, she became aware of the in e q u i t i e s faced by w o m e n reentering the community, including a

disproportionate number of soberliving environments and a lack of continuum of care as well as childcare and employment issues. Ideally, Tesa's completion of her master of science in addiction will assist her in advocating for change in these areas.

Join the Coastside Gives 2021 Action Team

Help make 2021 the most successful fundraiser yet!

Our goal is to build a team of AAUW-HMB members who can update our approach to Coastside Gives to take advantage of social media and increase the number of members who give to AAUW-HMB during the online Coastside Gives fundraiser.

Why do we need a team? We won't have the Pumpkin Festival fundraiser and Theater Bash is unlikely. Coastside Gives is our only way to raise funds for local scholarships, Tech Trek, local STEM workshop, Speech Trek and support AAUW research and advocacy through the AAUW Fund.

How can you help? Following is a list of positions and skills needed along with how much time will be required beginning in early 2021, peaking a month before Coastside Gives (typically the first week in May) and ending by June 1. Based on past Coastside Gives fundraisers:

• Preparation begins in mid-January or early February with an email from Mavericks Community Foundation detailing deadlines.

• After registration, we can update the AAUW page on the Coastside Gives website.

• Mandatory monthly meetings.

• At the meetings, participants learn about changes from last year's format, ask questions and learn how to have a successful online fundraiser.

• Approximately one month before Coastside Gives day, prizes are announced. The need for

volunteers increases at this time.

We need to fill the following positions:

Co-lead: Work with **Carol Joyce** to lead the Action Team, ensure all deadlines are met, schedule meetings and provide guidance and direction.

Commitment: Begins in January 2021 with an email announcing Coastside Gives and runs through the end of June. Expect four to six hours a month, then an increase in hours during April and May.

Volunteer Coordinator for Member Outreach: Identify and supervise volunteers who will reach out to members in the weeks before Coastside Gives with information on prizes and how to make donations. The Volunteer Coordinator will be responsible for preparing contact lists for volunteers and sharing scripts for phone or email messages prepared by the Action Team.

Commitment: Runs April through the day of Coastside Gives for one to two hours a week.

Social Media Coordinator: Lead a team of volunteers to develop and implement a plan based on 2021 social media prizes. Social media prizes in 2020 included making a oneminute YouTube video on how donations will be used and creative Facebook posts to thank businesses whose donations made prizes possible.

Commitment: Begins in April when prizes are revealed with approximately six to eight hours with assistance from volunteers.

Marketing and Website Coordinator:

After five years, our website and fundraising messaging need refreshing. The coordinator will work with the co-leads to review our website and messaging to make it more effective.

Commitment: Begins in late January and runs until May with four to six hours a month for meetings and implementation.
