Big Lift Collaborative News

The Big Lift Cohort continues to work toward meeting the educational needs of the children of the Coastside community.

A half-day in-person summer program is being planned for pre-school – third grade, with classes of 12 students.

Coastside Children's Programs is hoping to reopen the Montara Farallon View site on May 1.

The County Office of Education is pressuring the state to provide more adequate funding. The library continues to expand its programs including book clubs, a science after-school program, author visits, maker programs, and an April poetry month. The Boys and Girls Club has established learning pods, has started sports programs, and is

planning for the summer. Cabrillo Unified School District is hoping to reopen for pre-k, kindergarten, and

pods when the county is in the orange; the goal is mid-March.

Teachers and staff will be vaccinated. CUSD is applying for grants

to support the educational program.

The collaborative seems hopeful and excited to meet the needs of children who are suffering from remote learning. Everyone is anxious to provide the best programs possible under the current and future conditions.


Woman Suffrage Movement, Bob's work has been hailed as the suffrage "bible" by The Wall Street Journal, which also named it one of the five best books on the suffrage movement. A recipient of a research grant from the Schlesinger Library on the History of Women in America at Harvard, he served as a consultant on several suffrage-related books, publications, and films including the PBS documentary, "One Woman, One Vote." Bob has spoken at the Smithsonian Institution, the U.S. Constitution Center, and the Library of Congress. We are honored to have him present to our branch.

Encouraging Action from New Administration

There is encouraging news for women with the new administration in place: 144 women were elected to serve in Congress, 9.7% of them women of color. Women comprise more than half of the U.S. population, 36% are women of color. Six transgender people were elected to state offices. President Biden has assembled the most diverse cabinet in American history.

President Biden has issued executive orders:

- Protecting gay, lesbian, and transgender people from an array of discrimination in schools, the workplace, housing, and healthcare. Transgender people now can serve openly in the military.
- Restoring women's rights through federal funding for abortion providers and organizations such as Planned Parenthood.
- Rescinding the "Mexico City rule," which prohibited foreign aid to organizations that provided abortions and abortion counseling.

- Directing the Department of Urban Development to explore the effects of former President Donald Trump's actions on fair housing laws and halt new contracts for private prisons.
- Disbanding the "1776 Commission" designed to advance patriotic education in the wake of the "1619 Project" that explored how slavery and racisim shaped the nation's history.
- Reaffirming tribal sovereignty and acknowledging and disavowing discrimation against Asian Americans during the pandemic.
- Pledging to reunite families that had been pulled apart because the "zero tolerance" policy that led to the separation of migrant families at the border and providing a path to citizenship for the Dreamers.

The administration must work with Congress to convert in many of these anti-discrimination actions into law.



AAUW California's bylaws limit its board of directors to 12 members, including president, president-elect, secretary, chief financial officer, and directors.

This year we will elect three positions: president-elect (one-year term, 2021-22); chief

financial officer (two-year term, 2021-23); and one director (two-year term, 2021-23). Members running for office are:

This year we also will vote to approve the state proposed public policy priorities for 2021-23.

Public policy priorities guide all AAUW California actions that relate to public policy issues, including action on legislation.

Nominations are open until March 16. If you are thinking about joining the state board but are not quite ready to commit, please contact the Nominations and Elections Committee at nominating@aauw-ca.org so they can give you personal

assistance.

The voting period is from April 16 to May 7. When it begins, each member will receive an email message containing a personal invitation to vote. There will be a link that will take you to your ballot. No password or code needs to be entered. Members who do not have a working email address will be sent information via postal mail with details about how to vote.

National elections will also take place this year from April 7 to May 17. Elimination of the degree requirement for membership will be at stake. We will also vote on national public policy priorities. Visit AAUW to review the proposed changes.

We have seen what happens when we work together and vote. Please vote in both elections and please consider running for office—whether it is national, state, interbranch council, or your local branch. We need you!

There were four students who competed: Cameron Geronios, Brianna Johnson, and Conner Black from Half Moon Bay High School and Sophia Mateja from Pacific Collegiate School.

The first place winner was Conner Black, who will receive \$100. The three runners up will receive \$75 each. Conner's speech will be submitted to AAUW California for consideration in the statewide competition in April.

Conner is a 15-year-old sophmore in **Jim Ward's** Advanced English class at HMBHS. She previously attended

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AAUWAlumnae Make Black History Every Month

Women's History Month is a good time to reflect on the AAUW fellows and grantees who make Black history all the time. From 1978-79 American Fellow **Barbara Smith**, a founder of the Black feminist Combahee River Collective, to 2016-17 American Fellow **Keisha Blain**, who edited a new book with **Ibram X. Kendi** chronicling 400 years of Black history, these remarkable women span decades and fields. Sometimes they even interview each other!

AAUW alumnae are true trailblazers: There is the first African woman to lead the World Trade Organization (International Fellow **Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala**, 1977-78), the first African American female



chemical oceanographer (American Fellow Dr. **Ashanti Johnson**, 2000-01), and the first woman of color elected district attorney in Massachusetts (Selected Professions Fellow **Rachael Rollins**, 1996-97).
