President's Message Here Come College Graduates

A new year and I'm thinking about my relatives' college graduations.

I enjoy recalling the girls (and boys) we support with various activities through our branch: Speech Trek in February, Tech Trek Camp at Stanford University in July and our local STEM Camp. And let's not forget the stellar young women who received scholarships entering their junior year of college. They exude hope, optimism and a representation of accomplished people with a great future ahead.

An AAUW study found women make up 56% of today's college population. However, they hold 65% of the outstanding student loan debt. Women with bachelor's degrees owe an average of \$2,700 more than men. The main reasons appear to be that they select more expensive colleges that offer convenience and flexibility so that they can meet their family and work obligations.

AAUW has concentrated on programs like ERA, pay equity and Work Smart to increase paychecks. However, paying off college debt while trying to build a career and family erodes the pay earned, with the added insult of fewer retirement funds.

Should we discourage college and post-secondary education? Of course not! Educated women continually make influential inroads into corporations and politics.

I am looking forward to my two family college graduations with pride in their accomplishments and a positive hope for their financial future.

Students from Half Moon Bay High School and Pescadero High School are preparing to participate in the fourth annual speech contest sponsored by the Half Moon Bay branch of AAUW. The competition will be at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 22, in the Community Room at the Half Moon Bay Library. The speech contest topic is "Are men and women truly equal today, or are the suffragists of 1920 still suffering in 2020?"

Among other societal matters, students will reflect on the following

admonishment of **Abigail Adams**, who urged her husband to "remember the ladies" when drafting our country's founding documents:

"... I desire you would Remember the Ladies, and be more generous and favourable to them than your ancestors. Do not put such unlimited power into the hands of the Husbands. Remember, all Men would be tyrants if they could. If perticular care and attention is not paid to the Laidies, we are determined to foment a Rebelion, and will not hold ourselves bound by any Laws in which we have no voice, or Representation."

The students' coaches are AAUW members **Paulette Eisen** and **Antoinette Wrubel**, and Pescadero High School teacher **Jennifer Freeman**.

The three top speakers from local contests held throughout California will be invited to compete for a \$1,500 prize at the AAUW California State Convention on April 18 in San Francisco.

2019 Tech Trekkers Investigate Science Questions

It was science fair time once again at Cunha Intermediate School and our 2019 Tech Trekkers, now eighthgraders, entered projects on a wide range of topics.

In the physical science category, Ellie P., who aspires to be an astronaut, looked at rocket design with her project, "It's Just Rocket Science." She asked, "What rocket will fly the best without common parts?" She compared two model rockets — one missing fins at the base vs. one without a nose cone. She was awarded a second-place ribbon.

- "Got Gluten?" was the title of **Deia K**.'s project. She looked at the performance of four different types of flour in how cookies rise and spread while baking and she received a third-place ribbon.

- **Samara B**. entered her project "Cleaning the Creeks" in the environmental science category.

- In the behavioral science category, **Catalina J**. looked at the effectiveness of mindfulness

exercises as a tool in reducing stress levels in her "Mindful Minds" experiment. She was awarded an honorable mention ribbon.

- Also in behavioral science, **Aliya W**. was interested in how we perceive color in her work called "Seeing Colors." She received a third-place ribbon. She tested 31 people and concluded that blue text was the easiest to comprehend when reading.

More Good News on the STEM Front

You might have noticed in your most recent AAUW *Mission and Action* newsletter that a bipartisan effort, spearheaded by Sen. **Jacky Rosen** (D-NV), was able to pass the Building Blocks of STEM Act. It was signed into law on Dec. 24, 2019.

It will help expand educational opportunities in STEM topics (science, technology, engineering and math) for women, girls and students of color. The new law instructs the National Science Foundation to seek out and encourage young women and girls to be part of STEM programs, and to award research grants that promote understanding of ways to increase participation in STEM for girls in kindergarten through elementary school.

AAUW joined with other organizations such as Girl Scouts of the USA, Save the Children Action Network, Girls Inc., Society of Women Engineers and National Organization for Women to endorse the bill and get it through both houses of Congress.

How Women Fare in Public Policy

Student Debt

Women hold almost two-thirds of the national student debt, which stands at \$145 trillion. The gender gap of student debt has almost doubled in the past four years. Women take about two years longer to pay off their debt; because of this, they often put off saving for retirement, buying a home or starting a business.

Sexual Harassment

Based on a report from the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, sexual harassment in the workplace can take a toll on women's physical and mental health and reduce their lifetime earnings. Most victims are between the ages of 25 and 44.

Pay Gap

Women collect 80% of what men

do in Social Security benefits. The pension income of women is 78% of men's. The overall retirement income of women is 70% of men's. These figures show us how important it is for women to fight for equal pay from the time they first start working. Lower pay will affect them all their lives, especially in retirement, which many young people don't think about when they first start a job.
